He has previously held leadership positions at The Orange County Register (Santa Ana, Cali.), Las Vegas Sun, Washington Post and Lawrence Journal-World (Kan.). His work in newsrooms, dating back to the 1990s, resulted in some of the largest and most award-winning news sites on the internet, but local journalism and community engagement have always been the main focal points of Curley's work. He has started several, largescale community initiatives through the newspaper — including the Northwest Passages events series and the largest, paid high school newspaper internship program in the country. During his time, the newspaper has become a national leader in philanthropic-funded journalism and the use of Creative Commons. This alternate funding has allowed The Spokesman-Review to become the smallest newspaper in the nation to have a bureau in the nation's capital, to continue to have a bureau in Olympia, WA., covering statewide issues and politics, and

— with one of the nation's largest Ukrainian populations in the nation — The Spokesman-Review was one of the smallest news organizations in the world to send a reporter to Ukraine to cover the war with Russia through the eyes of its own community. In 2023, the news nonprofit Curley founded — the Comma community journalism lab — received its 501c3 status from the Internal Revenue Service, and helped relaunch the region's Black newspaper, The Black Lens.

Farewell to Felicia It's a see you later, not a goodbye!

At the APA fall board meeting in November of 2024, Felicia Mason announced her plans to retire later in the following year. About a month later, she had emergency surgery to replace the mitral valve in her heart.



There may have been a flaw in her heart, but Felicia has been the heart of APA for decades. and brought APA into the 21st century, seeing massive changes in journalism over her 38 years.

In every job, customer service is a requirement...no, a necessity. And she has drilled that into her staff and our member newspapers ever since.

was hired by Ad Manager Mike Ryland under Executive Director Bill Keller, who oversaw the move from Tuscaloosa to Birmingham with a goal of being closer to the larger ad agencies in the state. When APA moved to Birmingham later in 1987, Felicia commuted from Tuscaloosa for three years.

When Bill Keller left in the fall of 1990 to become publisher in Talladega, Mike Ryland was named executive director, and Felicia was promoted to advertising manager for the Alabama Newspaper Advertising Service. Under Felicia's leadership, APA and ANAS began offering an annual advertising conference that by 1995 was attracting almost 200 delegates. She also worked to diversify and grow the client base from about 10 to almost 50 clients by 1996, including landing large accounts with Strong Automotive for Chevy and handling statewide ad placements for the Alabama Power account.

As ANAS was growing with her sales efforts, Felicia went back to the well and hired Brad English in April 1991, who had succeeded her as ad director

at The CW. Later that year, she hired Leigh Leigh Tortorici as a tearsheet clerk, and the team was complete. But not for long.

When Mike Ryland unexpectedly passed away from a heart attack while lobbying for APA in the statehouse in March of 1992. a bond was formed by the existing staff that shaped the next 30+ years at the association office. With the strong support of the board, and Bill Keller returning as executive director to help steady the ship, Felicia and her staff became very busy building a strong client base, offering training opportunities to member newspapers, and placing over 90 Ala-SCAN Network ads in member newspapers every week. In the late 1990's, Felicia oversaw Project 2000, with the crucial expertise and foresight of then-college student Bill Smith (of The Eufaula Tribune Smiths), and later Kevin Slimp who helped the APA staff train the newspapers so they could learn everything they needed to know to fully paginate their papers electronically using the newest software and PDF capabilities. No more shipping veloxes to the papers for ads!

























In 2000, Felicia was named APA executive director when Keller took a position at Alabama Power. Felicia became the 11th executive director and the first woman to hold the position in APA's 129year history.

"Felicia has guided APA with grace, determination and a strong respect for her members. She has guided the association through profound changes in the newspaper industry, and she has helped make sure that APA adjusted to those changes," said former APA Executive Director Bill Keller.

Felicia's accomplishments are long and distinguished, and detailed on the timeline across these pages. What's important to know is that Felicia made a difference in everything she did. For members, she preached the virtues of customer service, placed tons of advertising, and lobbied in Montgomery for open records, open meetings, and preserving public notice. She poured herself into her work life, and became genuine friends with members, and still goes to visit current and former publishers all over the state. Felicia even spends weekends occasionally with some of her close, South Alabama APA buddies, riding on boats and sipping wine when her busy schedule allows.

The needs of the members have always come first, and Felicia addressed every single one that she was aware of. She has always done it with unbiased 2000

integrity and respect. And her reputation with ANAS clients was impeccable, giving each one the attention it deserved.

Felicia also made an impact at a national level. Years ago, she would attend conferences for National Newspaper Association (NNA) along with APA current presidents, especially when members like John Stevenson from The Randolph Leader also served as NNA's national president. Felicia has had a significant effect on her counterparts in other states, too. Newspaper Advertising Managers (NAM) is a group of association executive directors from all states that she was actively involved in. Bill Keller noted, "Her work with APA gained the respect of her peers around the country, when she was elected president of Newspaper Association Managers. Indeed, she has had close friends in NAM from Massachusetts to Georgia and from Minnesota to Mississippi."

Felicia's counterpart in Mississippi is one of those that has become a lifelong friend. MPS Executive Director Layne Bruce said, "Felicia was one of the first of my fellow execs to reach out and welcome me to the squirrely world

of association management many years ago. And she has been a tremendous well of encouragement and good humor for me through the years. Her sense of humor is a perfect fit for our oftenirreverent profession, and her contribution to the Resolutions Committee of NAM has been putting a smile on our faces for years."

Robin Rhodes, retired Georgia Press Association executive director, agrees: "Felicia and I met over 30 years ago at a Georgia-Alabama Advertising joint meeting in Birmingham, and I knew then we would be lifetime friends. Her leadership and friendship within NAM has made every member of the organization a better person. The NAM family will miss her sound advice and her humor. but her retirement doesn't mean she will be leaving her friends. Once she is a friend, she will be a friend forever."

The APA/ANAS staff has always been grounded by the leadership Felicia has shown. She created a culture of hard work, but having fun while you do it. The staff learned by her example of how to treat both

members and clients, and how to do it with grace even in difficult situations. She is always learning, even earning her MBA from Samford University at the age of 40.

APA staff member Jaclyn Langan said, "I am forever grateful for the opportunity to work at APA, but more importantly, I feel incredibly fortunate for the chance to work alongside people I learn from.

Felicia's mentorship has been invaluable to me. Not only is she a thoughtful leader, but also a truly wonderful, caring (and hilarious!) person. Her guidance and support has helped me grow and gain confidence in my role here. She will be missed day-to-day more than I think any of us know."

Felicia liked to bring inspirational quotes or stories to weekly staff meetings, and several times hosted her own version of a book club to the chagrin of the APA staff, to sneak in some sales and leadership training, but always finding a way to make it fun. She did these things to lift each staff member up to their potential, and always pushing to

get better. This was probably ingrained in her from her schoolteacher mother, and her father who ran the local grocery store and served as mayor of her hometown, Pine Hill, AL, in his 70s and 80s.


Brad English shared memories and well-wishes. "I've known Felicia for more than half my life. (I've stopped counting the years, but trust me, it's a lot.) She's always been a great boss, but more importantly, she is a fiercely loyal friend who genuinely cares for the people around her. I've seen her cry more times for others in the office than she ever did for herself. She could be tough when circumstances demanded, but she could also be the first one to pick you up when you were down.

I've learned more than I realize working beside her all these years. And I'll miss the countless conversations we used to have, not about work necessarily, but just about life. She truly is an amazing person. One who will be missed greatly, especially by the APA staff, who worked shoulder-to-shoulder with her for such a long time.

We once had a cabinet in the office that had more boxes of staples than one could count. FM said many times she would know it's time to leave when we ran out of staples. After 40 years, it finally happened. The staples are gone. Time to relax, Felicia. You deserve it."

Felicia believes in humans answering the office phone and working until the dot of 5pm, however her consideration for what goes on in the lives of her staff and the members shows her immense compassion and devotion to the organization and all the people in it. Leigh Leigh Tortorici said, "APA has been my work family since I graduated college, and I have Felicia to thank for that. She hired me as a tearsheet clerk, and I believe her strong support and guidance pushed me out of my comfort zone in the best possible way, and may have been the key to keeping our core staff together for 34+ years."

Following retirement, Felicia will work part-time on a contract basis with APA to manage APA Journalism Foundation activities, so this is not a final farewell, but definitely a salute to a job well done!



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



Mason's Retirement Leaves a Void in APA's Management Team

Since Felicia Mason dates back into the 80s, she remembers the days of film processors, waxers, blue line markers, X-acto blades Amberlith, and the legendary Compugraphic typesetters.

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


We ran out of staples
